Skies Over Denbury

What to see in the sky in December ...

Well this could be my last 'Sky News'! Remember that all the meteor showers I have previously mentioned usually happen at the same time each year and there are useful apps that can keep you up to date with what to look for but I will try to post any big events on the Facebook page if I can.

13th/14th December – Catch the peak of the Geminids meteor shower

The Geminids are one of the best meteor showers of the year thanks to bright, abundant, and multicoloured meteors.

The peak of the Geminids is on the night of the 13th December, but you can see meteors from this shower from 4th to 20th December although the moon will rise at around 21:30 on 13th December which may affect being able to see some of the dimmer meteors, so it's unlikely you will see as many as the maximum hourly rate of 150 meteors that are usually associated with the Geminids!

21st December: The Winter Solstice

Winter is on the way with the approach of the winter solstice! The winter solstice falls on 21st December at 21:48 and marks the start of astronomical winter. The Sun will be at its most southerly point, meaning that it will shine directly above the Tropic of Capricorn and the Northern Hemisphere will have its shortest day of the year.

Spaceport Cornwall - launch date coming soon!

History will be made when Spaceport Cornwall launches the first satellites to space from UK soil, all from a regional passenger airport!

Unlike traditional vertical launch locations, Spaceport Cornwall will use an existing airport runway and airport facilities to launch to space. Carrier launch systems, like Virgin Orbit's modified Boeing 747 Cosmic Girl, will take off at the end of the runway, fly up to altitude and deploy their rocket mid-air. The carrier aircraft will return to land, while the rocket will take its satellite payloads into Low Earth Orbit.

Well, on the first count, the jubilant, emotional scenes from Kherson in the last few days are perhaps proof that tyrannical despots such as Putin do not always get their own way. We can only hope that things continue to get worse for this man in 2023, something that

Notes from the Parish Council

Four members of the public attended the Meeting, but we did not have any District or County Councillors. Three of the attendees were supporting a Planning Application which was before the Parish Council, involving works to the Walnut tree with a Tree Protection Order, which lies in the garden of a property on South Street. The tree is overhanging the property, and also overhangs the garden of a property in Down View Road; there was some discussion that TDC should not have allowed the building to be created so close to a tree with a TPO, especially when the type of tree would grow in stature, as this Walnut tree has. The PC members had already looked at the tree report and had no objections to the works which were proposed.

Another parishioner brought questions about the legality of the Parish Council making decisions concerning the new village hall site, such as the creation of the orchard on part of the site. As the committee for the creation of the New Hall has disbanded, it was requested that the Parish Council take on responsibility for the site, which we own, and have been responsible for the site and the multi-court since then. It was resolved that the clerk would look into the legal side of the Parish Council responsibilities, and



would no doubt cause things to go a great deal better for all the rest of us, especially our brave comrades in Ukraine who are suffering so much.

I have to say, it is hard for any but the most committed optimist to see many glimmers of hope in relation to our terrible disregard for the environment. As seems to be happening at the current summit, so often leaders just seem to squabble and prevaricate while the world burns. The best that can be hoped is that, by the time things

get really bad, the world will have no choice but to act.

And as for the economy, although it may not seem like it, I think this is the least of these three worries.

Despite the efforts of certain politicians to send the economy into freefall, no doubt things will pick up eventually. I would say that a certain amount of belttightening would be good for us but, as is always the way, it is those who most need to reign in their lifestyles who are able to continue as if nothing was happening.

So, I wish you all the very best for 2023 - whatever happens, surely it can't be as bad as the present year!

that any remaining Trustees would be sought, and their permissions obtained if required. Our Chairman is one of the Trustees.

Permission has been obtained to be able to cut back the hedge along the path from Moorland Avenue down to the Playing Fields; this work will be carried out as soon as possible as it has been noted that it is not possible to walk on the pavement, but the grass is becoming too muddy and slippery to walk on.

It is hoped that the replacement lengthsman will find time to come and clear the buddle holes and enable our roads to drain again. The front and back of the prison roads, Shute Lane, and the very bottom of Heathfield Road have all been noted as flooding areas.

Embracing winter

Winter is a time of shorter daylight hours and not withstanding the challenges facing us in terms of increasing energy costs is a time incredible potential and transformation. I am in the middle of reread Wintering by Katherine May and I offer you three insights inspired by this book.

A time for letting go

During the winter we see the leaves fall from the trees revealing the new buds for the year to come. These buds are there bursting with potential ready for when the conditions are right. Winter is a time for letting go. We stop doing many things, have time to reflect and in this new possibilities are able to present themselves. In letting this natural wintering process happen we like the trees are renewed and become ready for when the time is ripe for our new potential to burst into life.





A time for resting

In the winter months dormice, hibernate however this is not simply one long sleep. Dormice approx every 10 days bring their body temperature up, wake up and check that their nests are safe and secure. Many people find they go to bed earlier and sleep for longer over the winter months. This is often accompanied by a time of wakefulness in the middle of the night. Before modern lighting this pattern of a double sleep would have been the norm. The night time hours can be a time free from the pressures of the day allowing a different type of exploration, reflection and creativity.

A time for insight

Frost and snow render the world fresh and new. It is magical as every child and adult (if we are honest) feels and knows. Even things that were less than beautiful before are made wonderfully beautiful when bejewelled with a frost or covering of snow. Over the winter months we enter into what some call a liminal space. The cold and dark invites us to see and do things differently, to slow down, to notice and gain new insight and appreciation.



There are many more wonderful insights in Katherine May's beautifully written book "Wintering: the power of rest and retreat in difficult times". I highly recommend it.

There are many community gatherings in our Churches and villages over the Christmas period and so if you fancy 1hr to sit in a pew, to receive, listen, feel, contemplate and take a break from the obligation to endlessly do why not join in. You are most welcome. Don't be surprised if you find yourself on the verge of tears or touched by something. I can't promise the lifting of all your woes but I can promise you a slither of light that might just make all the difference.
